

Serge Hochar has done more for Lebanese wine than anyone else in the country's present-day history. In 1930, his father, Gaston Hochar, had been inspired by a trip to France—he planted cinsault, mourvedre, carignan, cabernet sauvignon and grenache in the varied soils of Mount Lebanon's foothills, some 3,000 feet up in the Bekaa Valley. At the time, winemaking was mostly a backcountry affair, something a farmer did on the side.

Hochar, however, had grander plans. He built a winery on Mount Lebanon—closer to the commercial center of Beirut but farther from the Syrian border, and therefore, more insulated from political unrest. His son, Serge, started working around the winery when he was 18, and became winemaker two years later, in 1959, after finishing enology studies at the University of Bordeaux. Since

then, he's missed only one vintage-1976, when bombs

were falling too heavily to harvest the grapes—and he's built the winery into a national symbol of resiliency and culture. (The 1986 vintage, he concedes, was almost missed—only tw trucks made it to the winery, but they did manage to fill 18,000 bottles of wine.)

While Hochar is best known for red wines, his estate white wine is one of the great whites of the world, a long-lived, deeply golden blend of obeideh and merwah (thought to be the ancestors, respectively, of chardonnay and semillon). The 2001, from a hot, early vintage, shows its ripeness in roasted pineapple tones, but it's still fresh with vibrant acidity and rounded with beeswax and mushroom tones. The reds—all based on cabernet sauvignon, carignan and cinsault—run from the Cuvée Rouge (now called Musar Jeune), a bright, nonoaked red meant for immediate drinking, to the Estate Red, released with considerable age and the ability to go even further. The 2001 is particu-

larly impressive, with none of the flatness common to hot vintages. In fact, like all the Hochar wines, it's uncannily like its maker—a blend of Mediterranean exuberance tempered by continental reserve, refreshingly individual.—T.Q.T.
